NEW REFUSE CONTRACT INFORMATION

The Borough Council would like to thank everyone who provided feedback on the Refuse Contract Renewal. As you would expect, we heard very differing opinions across our community. Council used the feedback to select from the options presented by Penn Waste (the only bidder).

The new Penn Waste contract changes our collections to once per week using toters provided by Penn Waste. (You must use the toters provided by Penn Waste.) Based on your feedback, we were able to change the color of the toters to "an earth tone" instead of the blue seen in other communities. Penn Waste will also provided smaller sized toters upon request for those who may find handling the larger version difficult. One final highlight of the new contract is you can place two extra bags alongside of the toter each week (if they will not fit in the toter) and two extra bags each week for leaves the months of November, December, and January.

LEAF COLLECTION CONTINUES

You may continue to place two extra bags of trash out until January 31. The two extra bags are for leaves only.

FROM THE BILLING DEPARTMENT

Occasionally, the utility bills get lost in the mail. Call the Borough Office if you do not receive your utility bill by mid-month following the end of the quarter. For the quarter ending December 31, you should receive your bill by January 15. Not receiving your bill does not relieve you of paying the late fee.

Snow Season and Removal

The Public Works Department works around the clock to maintain road safety and provide emergency accessibility throughout the snow storm. The Public Works maintains approximately 25 miles of roads with seven personnel and seven pieces of equipment. We track potential storms and respond immediately as snow begins to accumulate. The Public Works Department plows and spreads salt and antiskid to maintain road safety throughout the storm. When driving, please operate with extra caution around snow removal equipment.

- Stay at least six car lengths behind a plow truck and remember the plow is wider than the truck.
- Be alert since trucks travel slower than other traffic.
- When the plow truck is traveling toward you, stay away from the center of the road since snow can obscure the actual snow plow width.
- Keep your lights on to help the plow operator better see your vehicle. Pennsylvania State law requires vehicle lights on when your vehicle's wipers are on.

Snow Removal Tips:

- Roads. Remove cars from streets and roadways before snow removal crews begin working on the roads. Vehicles parked on the roadways jeopardize the safety of road crew personnel and the public. Also. the snow cannot be removed from curb to curb when obstacles obstruct the roadway. The leftover snow around the vehicles is a hazard to the postal service and local traffic. Snow Emergencies (Ordinance #1987-7) prohibit parking on Snow Emergency Routes and local streets. Cooperation is needed to help crews remove snow quickly and efficiently. Snow Emergencies are announced on several radio and television stations including: WSBA-AM 910, WARM 103FM, and WGAL-TV Channel 8. The Shrewsbury Borough Facebook page will also report Snow Emergencies.
- 2. Plowing duration. Please understand the crews are not done plowing until the storm is completely finished and the snow is plowed curb to curb. The Public Works Department plows the roadways for local traffic and emergency vehicles with two lanes of accessibility during the storm. The roads are not plowed curb to curb until the snow storm is

- completely finished. When the storm is finished, the roads will be plowed all the way back to the curb line.
- **3. Driveway or sidewalk.** Do not throw snow from your driveway or sidewalk into the roadway. Keep the snow on your property and not on the roadway.
- 4. Property markings. Delineators or markers can help snow removal crews locate the curb line and prevent property damage. Snow removal crews strive to plow snow curb to curb but sometimes mistakenly get too close to your yard and damage grass. Any marker can help crews find the curb line.
- 5. Please keep trash behind the curb line during snow events. If trash cans are in the roadway, the cans will be knocked over and can disrupt the trash haulers.
- 6. Travel at slower speeds and allow greater stopping distances during storms. Stay off the roads if possible and allow snow removal crews the necessary time and distances to work on the roads. Operate with extra caution around snow removal equipment and traffic. Practice defensive driving and allow ample time to reach destination. Plan ahead and only travel if absolutely necessary. Snow removal crews can plow in a safe and efficient manner with less traffic. Be patient!
- 7. Fire Hydrants. Residents are responsible for clearing snow around a fire hydrant. The hydrant should have a three-foot clearance radius within 12 hours after a snowfall per Ordinance 2014-3. The Ordinance protects the community in case a fire occurs and allows the Fire Department to connect hoses and operate the hydrant safely. If you have a medical condition or are unable to clear your hydrant, please contact the Public Works Department for assistance.
- **8. Sidewalks.** Snow must be removed from the sidewalk within 24 hours after snowfall.
- 9. Mailboxes. The area around your mailbox should be cleared adequately for the safety and effectiveness of the Postal Service after the Public Works Department is finished plowing. Broken mailboxes will not be repaired by the Public Works Department if damaged by the snow during the snow removal process. Mailboxes that are hit by the truck or plow will be repaired by the Public Works Department so mail can be delivered.

Home Plumbing in Freezing Temperatures

Cold temperatures and drinking water can be a costly and dangerous combination. Proper planning and preparation can prevent frozen pipes, water leaks, and water damage.

- Disconnect outside hoses from outdoor faucets.
- 2. Pipes or faucets in unheated areas (garages, crawl spaces, and basements) should be insulated, heat tape applied, or heat cable used.
- 3. Insulate your house (doors, vents, cracks, and basement doors).
- 4. Know where your master water shutoff valve is (and that it works) in case of emergency.
- 5. Report leaks or running water outside your house to the Shrewsbury Public Works Department.
- 6. If pipes are frozen, use a hair dryer to thaw the frozen pipe. Do not thaw the pipes with a torch unless the frozen pipe is in an open area.
- 7. Never leave a home without heat on in freezing temperatures. Test and maintain heating system especially if home will be unoccupied.

Please contact the Public Works Department if you have questions about winterizing your home or where your main control valve is located.

2024 Utility Projects

- Shrewsbury Borough will replace water line on portions of West Railroad Avenue (Route 851), Charles Street, East Forrest Avenue, and West Forrest Avenue. The water mains and services will be replaced prior to paving in 2024 or 2025.
- Shrewsbury Borough will replace and install new storm sewer pipe on Charles Street for better drainage and replace deteriorating existing structures prior to paving in 2024 or 2025.
- · Shrewsbury Borough will repair storm sewer pipe on North Highland Drive prior to paving in 2024 or 2025.
- Columbia Gas will replace and repair gas mains and services on North Highland Drive, West Clearview Drive, North Sunset Drive, North Main Street and Locust Avenue.

RABBITTRANSIT

Shared Ride/Paratransit

Unlike a scheduled bus route that only operates in one area, Shared Ride (a.k.a. Paratransit) provides consolidated trips between travel origins and destinations during limited hours and specific areas.

All Shared Ride trips require a reservation. If you would like same-day service, you must make your reservation by 1:30 p.m. Otherwise, reservations must be made no later than 12:00 p.m. the business day before your ride. Reservations may be made two weeks in advance. For trips on Saturday, Sunday or Monday, reservations must be submitted by 12 p.m. the Friday before. Visit www.rabbittransit.org > Shared Ride > Reservations to schedule a reservation.

When making a reservation for Shared Ride, it's essential to plan accordingly since the service accommodates other passengers' travel plans. Riders are grouped together based on their travel time and location(s). Travel times may be shorter or longer, depending on the total number of riders at the time. While ride times may vary, Shared Ride is a reliable and safe transportation option that can give you peace of mind when accessing life-sustaining services.

If Shared Ride sounds like a fit for you, the first step is to submit an application to the program you'd like to participate in. Shared Ride programs vary from Senior Shared Ride to the Medical Assistance Transportation Program (MATP), ADA Complementary Paratransit Program (ADA), or Paratransit Full Fare. Planning a day out in the city, or need a ride to work? rabbittransit's commuter service, rabbit*EXPRESS*, operates multiple round trips on weekdays between York and Harrisburg; York and Northern Maryland; and Gettysburg and Harrisburg. Catch the Route 83S bus to York or Maryland at the Shrewsbury Park & Ride, located on Elm Drive in Shrewsbury Township. Regular fares range between \$3.50 and \$5 one-way.
